SPORT FOR THE MIND

Dean Kamen, engineer and inventor, began the FIRST LEGO League Challenge (FLL) in 1998 for students in grades 4-8. Kamen's non-profit FIRST foundation (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) also creates the FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) and FIRST Robotics Challenge (FRC) for high school students. There are currently more than 54,000 FLL teams on the planet who compete yearly in a scientific and real-world challenge. Teams learn about and research the yearly challenge topic in addition to building and programming a LEGO robot to compete autonomously on a 4' by 8' competition table with LEGO missions inspired by the challenge topic. Cargo Connect, which is the 2021-22 theme, involves the very timely topic of

the transportation of goods and services. Scrimmages and competitions are held locally with the top teams advancing to state, national, and international competitions.

The CMH Blazers robotics team consists of 10 students in the senior class, which is the maximum number of students allowed per team. They have built their robot and 16 challenge missions, as well as learned the programming language. In their first competition, the CMH Blazers qualified for the District competition, the next step on the way to the State Finals! During the competition season, team members will continue to learn about the problems involved in the transportation business while settling on a problem to solve and developing a solution. NEWS FROM PRE-PRIMARY

It is hard to believe that it is already 2022! The pre-primary classrooms are in full swing now and the children are very busy. The works in our classroom continue to change regularly as we add new concepts and skills which build upon each other. One important piece teachers consider when setting up new works for the classroom is something Maria Montessori called the sensitive periods of development. Sensitive periods are described as a time when a child is more likely to gain knowledge in one specific area. They vary from child to child but are typically seen sometimes during the three year cycle. Understanding the developmental stages of a child is highly valued in Maria Montessori's methods and is one reason why each year and group of children is handled based on their unique needs. Maria Montessori stressed that the environment must reflect the particular developmental period of the students. A few important sensitive periods seen in a pre-primary classroom are for order, language, movement and small objects.

The sensitive period for order is seen in many aspects of the classroom. The shelves are meticulously organized from the simplest to the most complex, and everything has an exact place on the shelf. Each lesson is presented in a particular order which most children try to mimic in order to come up with the same results. For example, when the teacher shows a lesson on shaving cream at the easel, we show students to get the water before covering their hands in shaving cream. If a child does not get the water first, as a natural consequence, they end up with hands covered in shaving cream. Hopefully they will help them remember next time to get the water before they start. This sensitive period for order helps children learn how important it is to pay attention to even the smallest detail.

The sensitive period for language is also seen within the children. This period begins well before entering the classroom. It usually begins at 4 months old and is a time when children are more susceptible to picking up sounds and forming a language. Even before children are able to speak words, they are absorbing everything that is going on around them for future language use. This stage is the hardest and therefore lasts the longest. When they are in the classroom environment, the children are getting a lot of new language, such as names of colors, shapes, objects and descriptive words such as tall, short, thick, thin and long. This language may seem simple but can be new for many of the young children in the class.

The sensitive period for movement is very important because this is when the child begins to explore. As a child begins his or her physical activity they begin to use certain muscles. As they get older they may use muscles in a particular activity that are not used in other activity. For example, a ballerina and a surgeon do not use the same muscles. Therefore, the muscles a child chooses to use has a strong influence on their individual personality. Works such as the pink tower, brown stairs, painting at the easel, golden bead materials and scrubbing activities all cater to the sensitive period for movement.

Another sensitive period is that of small objects. Children, beginning at the age of two, start to notice the small things in life that even we, as adults, may not notice. Ironically, many adults assume that children are attracted to more obvious objects such as bright colors and lights, however this is not always the case. Many Montessori materials have very small pieces to cater to that interest.

As teachers, we keep so many things of these stages in the back of our minds when preparing the environment for children. Maria Montessori described the classroom as the "prepared environment in which the child, set free from undue adult intervention, can live [their] life according to the laws of [their] development." (Maria Montessori Her Life and Work) Although times have changed since Maria Montessori taught, we as teachers continue to use her theories and teachings to guide us when we prepare our classrooms and work with your children each day.

NEWS FROM JUNIORS



Our children came back from Winter break excited to delve back into lessons, reunite with friends, and to return to the familiarity of their respective classrooms. We have been working on reflective and mindfulness practices such as gratitude journaling, growth mindset discussions, yoga, meditation, and social stories in order to build our toolkit of peace and harmony. Such activities are practiced nearly everyday and the children look forward to their time of quiet and personal reflection. Artistic reflection inspired by The Dot (Peter H. Reynolds) will surely make beautiful art show pieces. As Montessorians, we believe that if a child has peace in their hearts and calm in their minds, they are able to learn and grow much easier.

Junior children have been heavily focused on the study of Africa and everything that embodies this beautiful, vast, and incredibly inspiring continent. Many of our students have been entranced with the study of people who lived in the ancient civilizations of Egypt. They have done experiments pertaining to mummification, studied the creation of Canopic jars, the geometric principles of pyramid building, and research of some of the great pharaohs who reigned during the time of Old and New Kingdom Egypt. We have been really enjoying the presentations of country research projects throughout both classrooms and are delighted to see how children are able to demonstrate their abilities of research and writing. Presentation skills are something we begin to focus on in the 6-9 program, as children are more comfortable speaking in front of their peers.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the study of

other important civil rights leaders have been an important cornerstone of our reading and writing curriculum this winter. Junior children have learned a lot about the importance of inclusivity, diversity and civil rights through read alouds, individual research and short videos. We are proud to stand by one of Dr. Montessori's most beautiful declarations, when she said "Education is the best weapon for peace." Junior classrooms strive everyday to embody the principles of Dr. Montessori and other peace leaders.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

ELIZABETH BREWER

Hello wonderful Children's Meeting House family and friends!

My name is Elizabeth Brewer. I began my Montessori school education attending CMH when I was 3 years old. I followed in the footsteps of my three older cousins, who all attended CMH! One of those cousins was Rachel Eberhard, who is now the new Senior Class Teacher!

Children's Meeting House has shaped my life in so many beautiful ways. For one, at Children's Meeting house, my teachers empowered me to know and believe that every BODY is important. At CMH, I felt not only that I mattered, but that everybody mattered, and we did. We mattered to each other because we learned from each other. I remember being read to by the grades above me, and then, later, being able to read to the grades below me. This is the way we learned in Montessori, and how I learned to be a teacher.

Not a single child had a disability, rather, some of us were differently-ABLED. Some of us excelled at mathematics, some of us excelled at writing, some of us talked a lot, some of us hardly spoke at all. No matter what our superpowers were, we learned to appreciate each and every BODY for our unique gifts.

These 8 transformative years of learning at CMH shaped my worldview and I carried the lessons with me throughout my life. I began teaching yoga, mindfulness and movement in High School and continued all throughout college, and am still teaching today! It was in the college of Public Health at the University of Arizona that I met my dear friend Jessica Stebbins. Jessica was paralyzed from the chest down. Jessica knew that I taught yoga on campus multiple days a week and asked if I would teach her yoga. I told her I had no idea how, but I would be willing to try and learn. Jessica and I started an independent research study to bring yoga, mindfulness, and movement to students with disabilities. We were in the process of conducting a needs assessment when I received news that she had passed away. That evening I taught my yoga class at the university. I shared with my students her dream of practicing yoga and providing a yoga class for all bodies with no wheelchair user left behind.

Over 30 students from my yoga class offered to help make her dream come true. In Jessica's honor, I carried my lessons from Children's Meeting House Montessori, and made it a mission in my life to redefine disability with ABILITY through movement.





Eight other students from the college of public health joined our independent research study on the University of Arizona campus. We started a club on campus called Yoga for Any Body. I then had the opportunity to start the first yoga for disabilities program at a university serving wheelchair students with paraplegia, quadriplegia, and cerebral palsy. I won the University of Arizona Difference of One Award as well as the Arizona Inclusive Excellence Award for these efforts. I received this award because of you Children's Meeting House Montessori! Today, I am a full-time corporate wellness specialist at Meta Headquarters in Silicon Valley providing health assessments, mindfulness classes and movement services for Instagram, WhatsApp, Facebook, and Oculus employees. I am also the CEO and founder of Spread Loving Kindness, an organization dedicated to spreading loving kindness around the world. Through SLK, I have held healing retreats and congresses in the United States and Brazil for students from over 12 different countries. Missing my years of transformational learning, I am currently going back to school for my Doctorate in Clinical Psychology with a concentration in yoga and psychology and expressive and movement arts at Meridian University in Petaluma, CA. Meridian University has an integrative approach to psychology and a transformational learning model, which emphasizes personal engagement and experiential learning modalities. This is an approach and learning style I know, remember and love from Children's Meeting House Montessori! As I embark on this new journey in life, I am excited that I am continuing to learn the way your children are learning here at CMH today.

Described as one of the kindest, most caring individuals you'd ever meet, Elizabeth Brewer, pro-actively and passionately advocated for the establishment of Yoga for Every Body, (Yoga for Disabilities). Elizabeth's efforts, attitude and energy have been called truly inspirational and her undertaking has the ability to impact an entire population of students. Whether it's in her regular classes or through her efforts in Adaptive Yoga she brings students together that otherwise might not interact. She truly is the difference of one.


TURKEY TROT
