NEWS FROM PRE-PRIMARY

Pre-Primary is off to a great start to the 2022-2023 school year! We have welcomed many new families into our classrooms and we are excited to get to know them. In the first few weeks, children are getting comfortable in their new environments and getting to know new friends. Returning children are busy making new friends, welcoming old friends and are serving as great role models for our new classmates.

At the beginning of the year, children are learning how to choose work throughout their day. Some works may be meant for a table, while others may be meant for a rug. Some works may be for one person while other works may be something they can choose with a friend. Children have the opportunity to work independently, with a friend or with a teacher. As the year progresses, children become more comfortable in their environment and understand the rules and routines of their day.

Children are introduced to new works in the classroom through lessons given by the teachers either in large or small group lessons, or in a one on one lesson. They are then given a chance to explore those newly introduced works on their own. Choosing which work to begin their day can be tricky at first. As children become more comfortable in the classroom, their work cycle begins to grow. A work cycle is being able to choose a work, complete it to the best of their ability, clean up the work, return it back to the correct space on the shelf and then choose their next work. The work cycle builds responsibility and independence within the classroom. Ask your child about their favorite works, ask them if it is a rug work, or table work, whether or not they like one person works or to work with a friend. They will be eager to share what they have been busy learning!

Children will also be working toward normalization over the next couple of months. Normalization is the term Montessori used to refer to children who are able to concentrate and work freely in the Montessori environment, exercising self-discipline and peace. As children begin to normalize, they begin to demonstrate more independence.

Thank you for sharing your child with us this year! We are looking forward to a great year of learning.

Every fall, the Junior students start the year with the 5 Great Lessons. These are part of Montessori's Cosmic Education, her idea that children need to understand the big picture before they can focus on individual pieces—how can you find North America on a globe without first understanding that our earth is a sphere?

The Great Lessons are one of the most important teachings in the Elementary classroom. They strengthen the curriculum and lead the way for all different kinds of science studies and research. The lessons are meant to be told in a dramatic way, they should be exciting and are designed to awaken the children's imagination and curiosity. Through the 5 Great Lessons, the children become aware that the universe is billions of years old and that it is based on the law and order through which all creation is interconnected.

The first Great Lesson introduces the students to the coming of the universe and the earth. This lesson includes different demonstrations that show how the continents and oceans formed.

The second Great Lesson involves the coming of life. It revolves around the Timeline of Life—a long chart with pictures and information about microorganisms, plants, and animals that have roamed the earth thousands of years ago. This lesson puts an emphasis on the great diversity of life and every living being's purpose.

The third Great Lesson is the Coming of Human Beings. With the help of a timeline, a tool, and a hand, the children learn about the three gifts that make humans so special—a mind to imagine, a hand to do work, and a heart that loves. The beginning of civilizations and fundamental human needs are fascinating to children and this lesson is a great start for extensive research projects.

The fourth Great Lesson tells the story of letters and writing. We talk about the development of the written alphabet and another special human trait—the ability of committing thoughts onto paper. Children love to learn about pictographs, symbols, hieroglyphs, and other forms of early alphabets.

The Great Lessons conclude with the fifth one—the story of numbers. Early civilizations often only had “one”, “two”, and “more than two” as their numeric system before different numbering systems throughout the centuries lead to the decimal system that we use today.

All of the five stories hold a great amount of information about the origins of the world around us. These stories really are the starting point of all of the Elementary curriculum. We refer to them during cultural lessons to help the children form their view of the world and make connections that deepen their understanding of the universe and how everything is interrelated. It is wonderful to watch the students dive deep into their research and find what interests them. Come in and observe when your time allows and see for yourself all of the wonderful things happening in our lower Elementary classrooms.

After our initial return to school, the Seniors classroom launched into the Cosmic Curriculum, as Dr. Montessori called it, introducing our subjects for study by way of a series of Great Lessons. The first Great Lesson is the Coming of the Universe, which opens the gates for the study of areas like astronomy, chemistry, geology and physics. The second Great Lesson sheds light on the coming of life to earth, unlocking the subject areas such as biology, botany, oceanography, and paleontology. Our 6th graders delivered both of these lessons successfully to our eager 4th and 5th graders.

Following the success of the first two great lessons, the third Great Lesson, The Coming of Humans focused on the characteristics unique to humans, from our capacity to love and care for others, to our skillful hands that we've used to shape our world, and our incredible imaginations that have led us to explore beyond our home planet. With the coming of humans, our study of human history will focus on ancient civilizations for all levels.

Practical Life has also been present in our classroom from the outset, with students doing a variety of jobs to maintain our classroom community, including raising the flag, washing dishes, doing laundry,

vacuuming, and many others. Our Hot Lunch Chefs have been successfully completing their missions, from procuring the groceries, to preparation of the meal, and the eventual clean-up.

Students were eager to jump into enrichment classes including Nature with Veronica, Spanish with Blanca, Tech with Manuel, Art with Gina, Music with Annie, and Wellness with Casey. Celebrating the season's bounty by harvesting pawpaws from the CMH campus and turning them into a delicious bread, pie, and punch was a highlight of the Fall season.

At the close of October, Blanca led our Dia De Los Muertos celebrations. The Day of the Dead is a unique holiday and a joyful time that helps people remember the deceased and celebrate their memory. We have wrapped up the 4th and 5th Great Lessons, inspiring the children with the story of the coming of language and writing, and the coming of numbers. We have also started our study of Ancient China. Our students have been busy and the fall has flown by for us!

MEET THE TEACHER

ANGI BAKER

In the winter of 2005, our family visited the open house at CMH and I was sold! I knew that a Montessori education would be the best option for my children. My son, Alex Gelly, began the next fall as a kindergartener in PP2 with Leanne and Michelle. My daughter, Maddie Gelly, began as a 3-year-old in PP1 with Casey and Andrea as her teachers. At the time, I was in graduate school at the University of Cincinnati and had a work schedule that allowed me to be an active parent volunteer in their classrooms. The more time I spent at the school, the more I knew that I wanted to be a part of the community. During the years that my children were in school, I worked as both an assistant in PP2 and as a substitute teacher. Sparked by a love of education, I embarked on my own career that has now led me full circle and back to CMH.

Professionally, my background is in education with both my undergraduate and master's degrees in special education. I recently earned an educational specialist degree as part of the Educational Leadership program at Wright State University. At present, I hold a teaching license for special education and an administrative specialist license. I have worked as an administrator at a charter school as well as a classroom teacher for students with disabilities. Most recently, I taught MD, or multiple disabilities, students at Middletown High School. These are the students with the most intense disabilities, for example, students with significantly low cognitive ability paired with another disability such as blindness, deafness, or other physical impairments.



I was excited to learn of the opening for a Learning Support Services Director at CMH and the possibility of returning to the school that had educated my children as well as provided me with early opportunities to be hands-on in a classroom while in graduate school. The LSS Director role matches my skill set and I am elated to finally be a full-time member of the CMH community. It has truly felt like coming home.

TEACHER SPOTLIGHT

DIANE GERSTEN

Diane Gersten taught at CMH for 24 years and retired at the end of last year. As one of our school's longest serving teachers, we asked Diane what some of her favorite memories of CMH were and to tell us a bit about her CMH story. Diane began as a parent and played a major role in starting our PACT (Parents Assisting Children and Teachers) organization which is the backbone of our school today before embarking on her Montessori educational journey which made CMH her teaching home.

I "discovered" CMH while looking for a preschool experience for my son, Zak, in 1992. I immediately fell in love with what we called "the barn"—the lower level of Grailville's Oratory and home to CMH at the time. I found CMH to be such a warm and welcoming place that I spent many hours as a parent volunteer. I would help wherever I could, and soon became enthralled with the Montessori philosophy and how it served the needs of each child. I was a traditionally trained teacher and had taught at the middle school level prior to moving to Cincinnati and working for Procter & Gamble as a training specialist and Media Manager. I was so convinced by what I was experiencing at CMH, that I decided to

pursue Montessori training. My first classroom experience was as a Pre-Primary assistant working with Lucia Hopple and Leann Varon. Despite the adorable faces, I knew my passion would be to work with the 6-9 ages in the Juniors classroom. The following year, I began teaching with Dana Dale in the Junior North classroom in what was the first phase of our current building. Dana soon completed her 9-12 training and joined John Phenix in the Senior classroom. This gave me the incredible opportunity to work with many different partners throughout the years. As CMH continued to grow, the building grew too and I moved into our current Junior South classroom teaching with Peggy Goodnow and remained in the Juniors wing until Spring of 2022, working with many incredible partners including current teacher Anne Tobe.

I loved teaching math and the cultural subjects. My favorite lessons to give were the stamp game, bead frame, and the checkerboard. I enjoyed watching students in Juniors move from manipulatives to the abstract as they mastered their understanding. Working with students in the kitchen was always a highlight as we made pumpkin bread every year.



I have too many wonderful CMH memories to list, many involving my own children, Zak and Chloe, and so many with the awesome students and their families, and my incredible colleagues throughout the years. In addition to my memories I treasure the PrePrimary quilt I won the year Zak and Chloe were in the same class—it still resides on a guest room bed! CMH will forever hold a special place in my heart.

Future Astronomers

At the beginning there was nothing. Total darkness...then, I carefully hold up a black balloon filled with glitter and watch the children's eyes in amazement when it pops and the "big bang" erupts before our eyes. It was during this moment, in the middle of the First Great Lesson (Coming of the Universe), that I was inspired to learn more about astronomy.

Fast forward to summer, while in sunny Florida, miles away from CMH and lesson planning, I learned that I was the recipient of a beautiful Orion XT8 Dobson telescope. Suddenly, memories of an application, the Cincinnati Observatory, and the Future Galileos project came flooding back to me. Wait...I know nothing about telescopes and astronomy education. Yet, I think back to the First Great Lesson and the feelings it gives me every time I present it, and I remember that in May I decided I needed a telescope to take that lesson to the next level. And here we are.

I spent the majority of my summer spending time with nine other Future Galileos recipients and training with Astronomer Dean Regas from the Cincinnati Observatory. We built our telescopes and started looking towards the night (and day) skies, practicing calibrating our scopes, changing lenses from 25 mm to 10 mm, figuring out why I couldn't find the sun EVEN when I was using my solar lens, and learning that a full moon isn't all it's cracked up to be through a telescope. My summer was filled with process, very little product, yet I couldn't wait to come back to school and spread curiosity through our Great Lessons (and telescope).
